# A belated Happy New Year to all Charlton Society Members and Neighbours

#### The White Swan

Since December the rubbish has now been cleared from the side entrance and the door into the rear of the building has been repaired. As of yesterday, it looks as if someone is in residence there again, although whether using the manager's premises or the pub itself is not clear.

Two members of The White Swan Music and Arts Group (TWSM&A) joined the January Charlton Society January committee meeting to discuss what is happening. It was agreed that Charlton Society would reapply for continuation of an Asset of Community Value for the White Swan, which is due to end on 12<sup>th</sup> July 2025.

Members of TWSM&A explained that following their presence at the December Sparkle in the Park event the petition now reached 1200 and they are building up their supporter base.

The meeting also agreed that we should all keep a close eye on the state of the building as there was a worry that further dereliction cold occur.

CHARLTON SOCIETY MEMBERS AND NEIGHBOURS PLEASE keep a good look out for any signs of further damage to the building and if you see anything suspicious CONTACT the Charlton Society Committee. We will then forward this to the Council and the TWSMA group.

# **Planning Matters**

*Charlton Riverside:* A meeting was held on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> January between members of Charlton Together and Emma Sweeney, Royal Borough of Greenwich. Emma has taken over from Jeremy Smalley who left the employ of Greenwich Council in December 2024.

Details will be given in the next newsletter, but one person said it was a constructive meeting.

**VIP Trading Estate:** A meeting was held between Charlton Together and Greater London Investments (GLi) to discuss early plans for redeveloping the site adjacent to Atlas and Derrick Gardens off Anchor & Hope Lane, Charlton. GLi will act both as developers and managers of the site and intend to produce a sustainable development. It is hoped that this first positive meeting will be followed by a longer lasting relationship with the developers.

**Environment Agency:** The Environment Agency (EA) is inviting river users who may be affected by any changes to the Thames Barrier to share their thoughts. The EA's Thames Barrier Scheme of Operations sets out the movement of the gates for: test closures, experiments, and renewing or replacement works. (Although they are making no changes to it currently, they are expecting to make significant changes in the future.)

The Scheme is prepared in consultation with river users and is approved by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA). It now requires its three yearly update and approval from DEFRA.

The Environment Agency encourages anyone who might be affected or who wishes to follow future consultations on the Scheme to complete the form.
